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Introduction

Consistent with best practice and in accordance with [*The Principles of Accreditation: Foundations for Quality Enhancement*](#) (2018) of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges, Miami Dade College identifies, evaluates, and publishes multiple measures of student achievement to document student success.

The Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) in this report include a comprehensive measure of student achievement that Miami Dade College uses for monitoring its effectiveness in promoting the success of its students. The College is using five student achievement measures which include graduation, success, retention, transfer and continuing education, and job placement rates to document student success.

Miami Dade College's KPIs are informed by:

- Measures of student success used in external transparency and accountability efforts such as the Florida Department of Education Performance Funding Model, the U.S. Department of Education College Navigator and College Scorecard, national accountability initiatives such as the Student Achievement Measure project, and reporting to funding organizations;
- Metrics used in internal institutional effectiveness processes such as strategic planning, program and service reviews, best practices, and other assessment and evaluation activities; and
- College priorities.

Unless otherwise indicated, this KPI report includes data from publicly available sources.

Graduation Rates

The College monitors undergraduate graduation rates as measure of success of its students. Miami Dade College selected IPEDS traditional overall graduation rate (150% standard time) for entering full-time, first-time degree-seeking students as its Key Student Completion Indicator in Fall 2018.

The U.S. Department of Education and Florida Department of Education graduation rates are calculated as the proportion of an incoming cohort of first-time students who start full-time in the fall term at a particular institution and who graduate at that institution within a certain period of time. In addition, the National Student Clearinghouse Research Center produces a report of students who complete at other institutions.

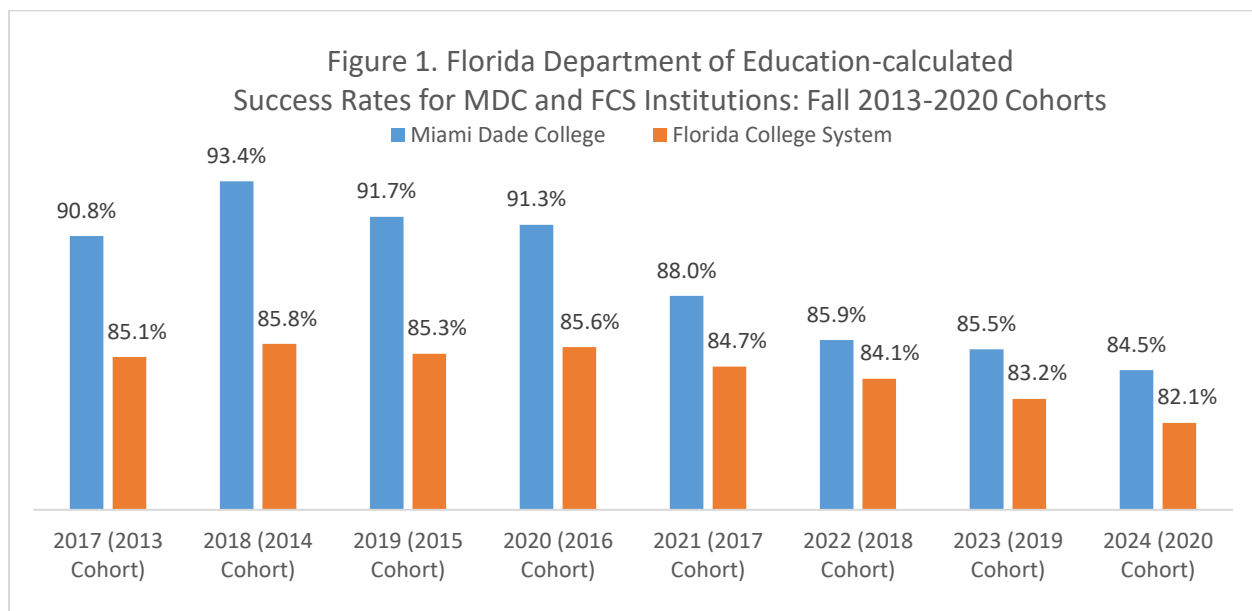
Success Rate

Miami Dade College tracks success rates of undergraduate students as a measure of student achievement. The Florida Department of Education has developed a success rate metric that measures the proportion of an incoming cohort of first-time students who graduated; who are still enrolled in good standing; or who left an institution in good standing. The success rate more accurately describes the outcomes of students who enroll at community colleges.

Retention Rates

Miami Dade College tracks two types of retention rates, including fall-to-fall and fall-to-spring. Both rates are used for determining student progression. Fall-to-fall retention rates are recognized as an industry standard and depict the students who continue enrollment to the subsequent academic year. The fall-to-spring retention rates are also valuable for identifying earlier breaks in enrollment with the purpose of implementing strategies to re-engage students who stop-out of enrollment.

Fall-to-Fall Retention Rate

The fall-to-fall retention rate measures the proportion of first-time-in-college degree/certificate-seeking students who enter in the fall term and who re-enroll in the subsequent fall term.

Transfer and Continuing Education

Miami Dade College is listed as a public four-year institution in IPEDS, but the College student success metrics are accurately categorized as community college based on the College history, mission, and degree mix. Miami Dade College monitors continuing education rate of Associate in Arts (AA) degree completers as a measure of student achievement. Florida community colleges use data provided by the Florida Education and Training Placement Information Program (FETPIP) to determine AA graduates' continuing education status. FETPIP is a state-level data collection and reporting system established by Florida statute to provide follow-up data on former students and program participants who have graduated, exited or completed a public education or training program within the State of Florida.

Continuing Education Rate

The Florida Department of Education tracks the subsequent enrollment of students who complete Associate in Arts degrees.

Bachelor's Degree Outcomes for Transfer-Out Students: NSC Research Center Analysis

Supplementary to the continuing education rate measure, the College also monitors the cohort of first-time students who started their studies at MDC and tracks their transfer and completion patterns at four-year institutions over a period of six years.

The National Student Clearinghouse tracks transfer outcomes of the first-time-in-college degree-seeking students who started at MDC in fall 2015 cohort and transferred to a four-year institution. Specifically, outcomes of students who completed a credential at MDC before transferring and those who earned a bachelor's degree at a four-year institution are presented below.
